HISTORY

Founded by Noah Timmins in 1912, this Northern Ontario city quickly became the residence of dozens of gold prospectors following the discovery of the Porcupine Mine, one of the largest gold mines in the world. The introduction of the rail system spurred further growth, along with the McIntyre Mine.

While Timmins' growth is certainly attributed to its mining heritage, the city also offers a diverse offering of other natural, cultural and recreational diversions, which make it one of Northern Ontario's







ATTRACTIONS

CEDAR MEADOW RESORT & SPA

PORCUPINE MINERS' MEMORIAL

The Porcupine Miners' Memorial is a tribute to Timmins' history. The statue of a miner, head frame and tablets with the names of 594 miners killed in mining accidents was unveiled in 2008 and, in the following year, the statues of a mother and two children were unveiled to commemorate those families left behind.

TIMMINS MUSEUM: NATIONAL EXHIBITION CENTRE

Timmins Museum hosts a long list of special exhibits and events, including a history gallery featuring artifacts and stories of the Porcupine Camp, one of the country's most significant gold mining communities. The Museum also offers travelling exhibitions from across Canada, workshops dealing with arts and heritage themes, and an annual Christmas Arts and Crafts Sale.

TIMMINS INTERNATIONAL FIREWORKS COMPETITION
